Our year

We are very pleased to have emerged from the long 2021/22 tunnel which included the Covid pandemic, associated lockdowns and resulting staff shortages. Each Club had unique circumstances to manage and the successes and highlights of the year are thanks to the dedicated staff, Teachers and volunteers who worked with dedication and passion to embrace change and challenges, and overcome the technical hurdles which arose unexpectedly.

No-one expected the fatal shark attack in the week prior to the 2022 Murray Rose Malabar Magic Ocean Swim and the event's cancellation at the eleventh hour. We were very grateful to our volunteer organising committee who dealt with the news sensitively and compassionately.

The Board's decision to invest approximately \$250k into growth and improved quality services has been, and will continue to be, fundamental to our ongoing quality and sustainability.

We introduced online induction for our Lead Teachers, Teachers and In Pool Volunteers through our new Rainbow Edge program. This has provided our Teacher workforce with increased resources in the form of specialised equipment and pool deck visits from occupational therapists.

We also launched our Rainbow Squad program which now has 150 members. Our Active Moves program is firmly embedded in Caringbah with a start up program underway in Newcastle.

We've set in place foundations to extend our reach down the NSW South Coast and into Queensland.

Thank you to everybody on the Rainbow Club team for always striving to help children with a disability enjoy swimming.

- A new kit which includes timers, This-Then Boards and photographic Visual Aids
- Club visits by our favourite Occupational Therapists Anna, Kate and Jen, who provide support and expert guidance

Squads Hubs flex

Since launching our Rainbow Squad program, 150 participants have enjoyed one hour sessions led by qualified Competitive Strokes Teachers in 20-25m pools across our network. Each Squad Hub is slightly different but all focus on fun, friends and fitness. Sessions are age appropriate and for members of similar ability. Some participants focus on personal bests (PBs), or enjoy competition, while others prefer to improve their endurance and strength. In June 2022, the Squads Carnival highlight was the Club v Club Relay, won by Hurstville Rainbow Club. Squad Hubs now operate from 13 different locations. Beach action Rainbow Club Active Moves and Rainbow Squads members had a sensational day at the beach in January 2022, learning to surf and join in with activities and games on the sand. The social day,

run by Super Groms, allowed for members to connect, and socialise while learning new and exciting skills. The delightful day provided some members with their first experience in the ocean, and for others their first ever beach experience.

Active Mover Cristian

Cristian is 20 years old and is non verbal with Autism and Global Development Delay, so exercise physiologist Kayla designed a program to maintain Cristian's muscle strength, increase shoulder flexibility and improve his freestyle swimming. "I felt Active Moves would be suitable for Cristian because he loves to swim and it gives him exercise and social connection. It ticks all the boxes" says Ernie, Cristian's Dad. "Rainbow Club has been a big part of our lives and Cristian looks forward to swimming. Active Moves addresses a huge need for young people transitioning into adulthood. Thanks for making this a reality."

Empowered Teachers

Skills development, training programs, new resources and networking help build capabilities for our Teachers





Once lockdowns were a thing of the past, Rainbow Club made up for lost time with two Teacher Connect Meetings in quick succession.

In January 2022, Lead Teachers came together to share and learn from each other and were given Key Word Sign (KWS) training by Tanya Jarvis. KWS is a useful and practical skill and is now available in many of our Clubs to assist members who may need this extra form of communication to understand their Rainbow Club instruction.



Our April Connect featured the launch of Swim the Rainbow 2.0 by Jackie Cole and Nicola Davies-Cooke. A new Teacher Kit and Visual Aids co-designed with our Occupational Therapist team were delivered, together with training for using the Kit and Visual Aids.

Shaping our future Teachers train to teach



Our Train to Teach program provides potential Teachers with a high standard of special intensive training. It is offered to Rainbow Club family, friends and those working in the disability services community. Participants can become a Qualified Swim Teacher for free. New Teachers are given the unique experience of teaching Rainbow Club members water safety and water survival skills. The program delivers sought after training for diversity, inclusion and accessibility for children and young adults with disabilities.



Enhanced support

Young people bring together their passion for swimming and helping children with a disability, by volunteering their time on weekends at Rainbow Club. In Pool Volunteers have become a vital part of our Clubs, working alongside Teachers to support, encourage and ensure our members stay safe and have fun. In Pool Volunteers assist Teachers by demonstrating skills, racing with members, recording time laps, and managing our equipment. Most importantly, they engage and socially interact with our members who adore our volunteers' youthful energy.

Spotlight on In Pool Volunteers

Sisters Jade and Amber are In Pool Volunteers at Lane Cove Rainbow Club. They are volunteering as part of the Community Action Service (CAS) program. 
New Life Member Bob McCotter



With over 1500 members, each Rainbow Club member has an original story to share. Here are a few from 2021/22:

Kenton is an inspiration

Kenton began swimming as a member of Maroubra Rainbow Club in 2018. Right away, Kenton developed a close bond with his Teacher Arthur who he describes as "always the coolest bruh in the room". Julia, Kenton's mum says "During their lessons together, it is amazing how many stories of brotherhood and pearls of wisdom transpired in the pool in those 30 minutes'. Kenton's anecdote is 'what goes on in the pool stays in the pool'... let's just say Arthur has had a full life!"



Arthur inspired Kenton to push himself further, and Arthur's answer to a seemingly impossible task is always "that's alright, you can do it". This was always said with a cheeky smile and a twinkle in his eye. This motivation and their close bond helped Kenton to achieve his goal and graduate from Rainbow Club's Swim the Rainbow program.

Kenton is now in year 10 and has never forgotten Arthur and the positive impact Rainbow Club has had on his life. Kenton approached Rainbow Club looking to be an In Pool Volunteer. He wanted to be a part of Rainbow Club again to give back to the community and help others have a similar experience to his. Kenton has gone on to join our Train to Teach program and is now a qualified Swim Teach with Bondi Rainbow Club. Kenton is a great success story and an example for all Rainbow Club members of what can come after graduating from our Swim the Rainbow program.

Meet Frankie

Seven year old Francesca aka 'Frankie' has been swimming at Cronulla/ Miranda Rainbow Club for three years. She attends Kirrawee Public School in a support unit, and several of her classmates are also at Rainbow Club.



Kym, Frankie's mother, says "Frankie always seemed to be having way too much fun in the pool and hadn't really wanted to swim. But this year, we think due to a big developmental leap, Frankie is finally swimming! She has the confidence and has now learnt water safety, which gives us great comfort that if she was to ever fall in the pool she would be able to swim to the side and get out of the pool safely".

"Frankie's lessons support her body tone, strength and resistance. Plus it's a wonderful opportunity for her to stay fit and healthy. We are so proud of all her achievements in the pool and know that due to the dedication of her Teacher Georgie, Frankie is now a swimmer".

Rachel joins Active Moves



As a preschooler, Rachel learnt to swim at Cronulla with Rainbow Club Founder, Ron Siddons. Rachel has now joined Active Moves and loves attending every week. Rachel's mother says "She has made new friends and reconnected with some old ones. Rachel doesn't realise all the fun in the water is also doing her the world of good. It develops her confidence and gives her the benefits of therapeutic movement and exercise each week".





Swim the Rainbow is a unique program that personalises learning to swim for children with a disability. It provides social opportunities and recognises progress as a child moves through the colours of the rainbow. As they achieve their goals it supports them in the transition to squads and mainstream aqua activities.
